

Congratulations to Maurice Johnson

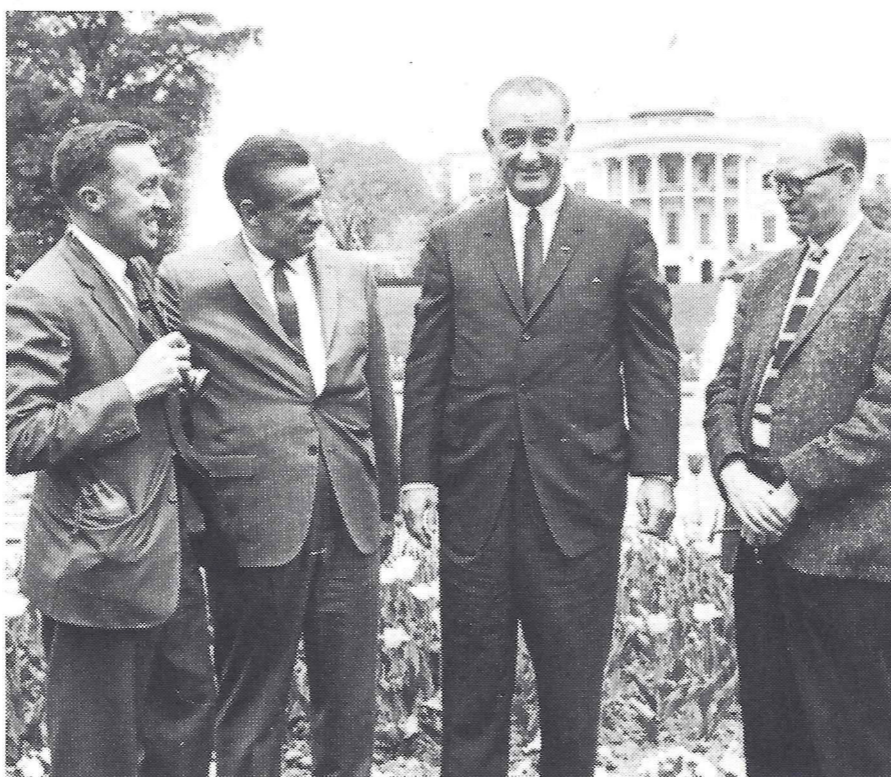
Winner of the 1988 Kodak/White House News Photographers Association Achievement Award

Maurice Johnson, of Chevy Chase, Maryland, has contributed over 50 years of service to news photography, and in that time he has earned the respect of his peers the world over. Twice he took top prize in the White House News Photographers Association (WHNPA) Presidential Class awards. Also to his credit are the Long Island University George Polk Award and the Graflex Award, and in 1983 he received a spe-

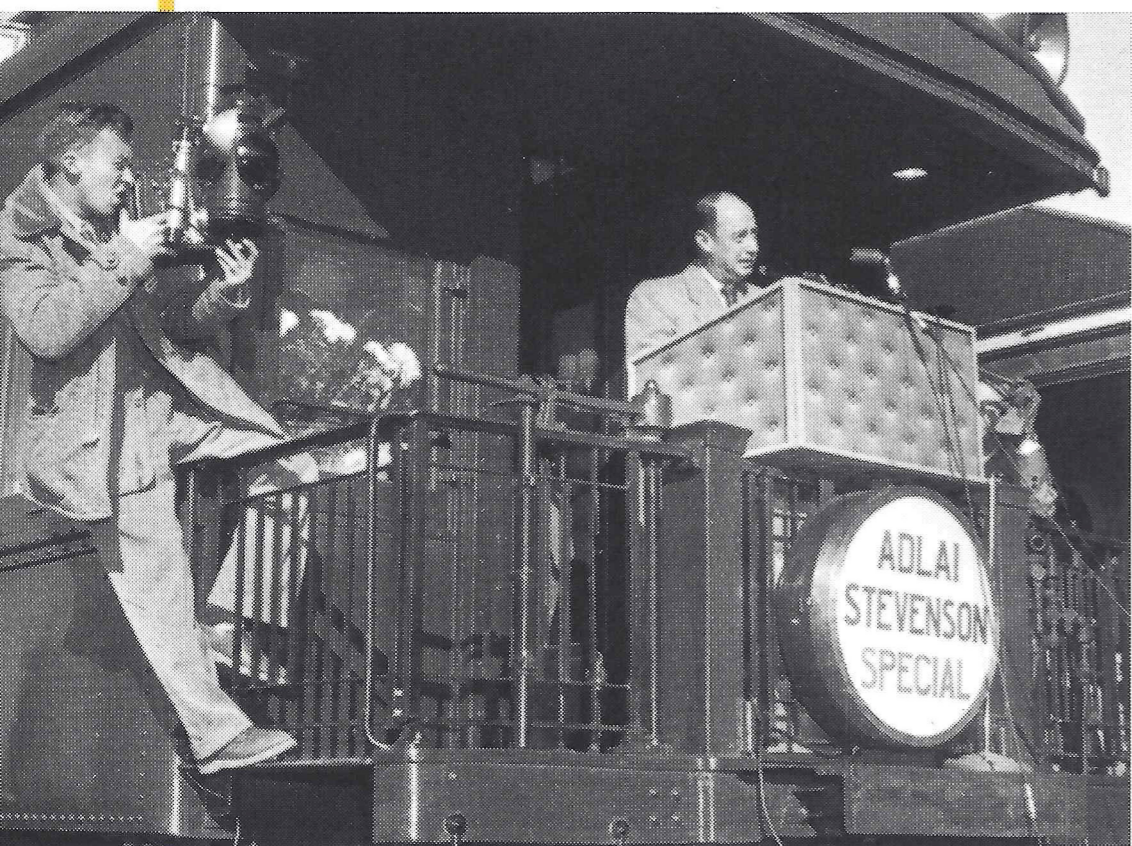

Philadelphia and Washington. In 1956 he was named Washington Bureau Manager. Two years later he signed on as a staff photographer in Washington with United Press International, and in 1970 took his present position as the Superintendent of the United States Senate Press Photographers Gallery. Johnson is responsible for accreditation of photographers with Congressional assignments as well as photography arrangements for conventions, presidential inaugurations, and news events at the Capitol.
